It is with confidence and pride that we feature the **Day Programs of the Communities of Don Guanella and Divine Providence** in this edition of the Newsletter. To visit our Day Programs is to experience a warm and nurturing community focused around a myriad of structured activities where caring, learning, and fun abound. A genuine eagerness and creative energy animate our dedicated staff as they meet the ever-changing

needs of each of our day clients, while also achieving new outcome measures in the evolving field of services for persons with intellectual disabilities.

Located on the grounds of Our Lady of Fatima parish in Secane, Delaware County, our Day Programs provide comprehensive services daily for 250 individuals. Our clients come from Divine Providence Village and Don Guanella group homes, as well as those living in the com-

munity. Services include individual and group activities aimed at building life skills; volunteer opportunities, job coaching and supported employment; specialized services for those who are aging; and an array of health and wellness, communication, sensory, and recreational programs. The pages that follow describe these programs in detail, while providing the human lens of client and staff stories through which to view a "day in the life" of the men and women we serve. Here's what undergirds our efforts:

• A firm commitment to implementing the "Community Rule," mandated by the PA Office of Developmental Programs, to provide increased community integration opportunities for people with intellectual disabilities. Our Day Programs have proven highly successful in meeting the state's new metrics for individuals to be engaged in meaningful community experiences.

• A consistent emphasis on enhancing options for individual choice and person-centered planning based on each one's unique medical and behavioral needs. This yields creative new ways to support some clients in the community, while allowing others to flourish in our

sheltered workspace.

• A genuine openness to new ideas, training, and practices, in particular for staff serving those with dementia and autism. We strive to be a learning organization that encourages staff development and growth, both individually and collectively.

We hope that you are inspired by what you read, and gain a better apprecia-

tion for the role of our Day Programs as an integral component of our continuum of care. As always, our benchmark is ongoing fidelity to our mission to serve and empower those with intellectual disabilities, and fulfillment of core values like compassion, dignity, and excellence. 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
LIFETIME OF SERVICE Celebrating 40 Years of Commitment with Catholic Social Services (CSS)

EMBRACING COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

Through Individualized Day Programming



We are blessed to live in a time when persons living with intellectual disabilities are valued as unique individuals who possess their own God-given abilities and talents. Guided by our Core Values, the Day Programs at Our Lady of Fatima in Secane have embraced the task of identifying, promoting, and enabling participants to reach their unique potential.

We are accountable to state and federal guidelines that continue to evolve in ways intended to provide increased community integration. This has, in turn, sharpened our ongoing focus on providing the most appropriate opportunities and achieving the best outcomes for each individual. For some, that means pursuing options for gainful employment in the community that often prove quite rewarding, providing greater independence and more meaningful and inclusive experiences of community participation. In fact, our Strategic Plan has prioritized increasing the range of opportunities available for individuals to fruitfully engage in community activities, according to their capabilities and interests.

In order to provide the highest quality of service to our individuals, the Day Programs staff have all received specialized community integration training, and the *Association of People Supporting Employment First* (APSE) has certified our management team and job coaches as Employment Specialists. Currently, about one third of the individuals in our Day Programs spend at least 25% of their day out in the community working, volunteering, or being involved in recreational activities. Our goal is to continue to increase the level of community participation by exploring partnerships and relationships that can afford new opportunities for as many of our individuals as possible.


MEGHAN AND CATHY Attitude Ambassadors at 1847 Financial

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ROOTED IN MISSION: A Radical Call to Unconditional Love by Father Dennis Weber, SdC

Previously, I had written about an initiative adopted within the Developmental Programs Division (DPD) called **Rooted in Mission**, with this year's theme being **Agape: Unconditional Love.** Our mission – whereby our purpose and meaning are defined, core values are identified and lived, and Catholic identity is embraced as integral – is therefore "rooted" (ingrained, embedded) both individually and corporately in the day-to-day services and support provided to those entrusted to our care. This year, we emphasize how this "rootedness" is exemplified in what the scriptures call *agape* or "unconditional love."

To understand this further, it is helpful to look at the source of the word "rooted." As is often the case, many English words derive from Latin; the Latin word for "root" is *radix* and for "rooted" is *radicati*. From "radix" we derive the English word "radical," which is often used in a negative way to describe someone or something as extreme, uncompromising, or revolutionary. But in its truer and deeper sense, a "radical" rootedness characterizes someone or something that is essential, fundamental, far-reaching, and pervasive. In this sense, we can see that Jesus Himself, and his message to love one another as God loves us, was and is "radical." So for us to be radically rooted in our mission means that we manifest God's unconditional love for all people as fundamental to, and pervasive throughout, all that we do.

The mission statement of Catholic Social Services of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia proclaims that we "continue the work of Jesus." The DPD Rooted in Mission initiative invites all of us to reflect on a different quote every three months as we strive to be radically committed to fulfilling that call to do what Jesus did. This quarter we are challenged to live out these words of Pope Benedict XVI from *Deus Caritas est (God is love):*

"Practical activity will always be insufficient, unless it visibly expresses a love for others... My deep personal sharing in the needs and sufferings of others becomes a sharing of my very self with them...I must give others not only something that is my own, but my very self; I must be personally present in my gift."
